

National University of Mexico Summer School

For Mexican and Foreign Students

July 7th to August 21st, 1925

COURSES:

The classes are held in the historical and beautiful "House of the Grotesque Faces," on Avenida San Cosme. Subjects covered are elementary, intermediate and advanced Spanish; Mexican, Latin American and Spanish Literature; Life in Mexico and Latin America; Methods of Teaching Languages; History; Anthropology; Archaeology; Mexican and Spanish art and architecture; Folk songs and music; Folk dancing.

TUITION AND CREDITS:

Thirty dollars (\$30.00) or sixty pesos for the complete course of twenty to twenty-five hours per week; twenty dollars or forty pesos for eleven to nineteen hours per week; ten dollars or twenty pesos for five to ten hours per week.

A certificate of scholarship showing completion of courses and credits may be obtained upon passing final examinations. Those who do not wish to take examinations, may secure a certificate of attendance.

ADVANTAGES:

Mexico City has a cool even temperature all summer. It is situated in the Valley of Mexico, surrounded by a rim of beautiful mountains visible from all its streets. It is rich in traditions, legends, historical interest and has a greater number of magnificent architectural examples than any other Latin American Country. Short trips from the City of Mexico will bring students to old Colonial centers or the ruins of magnificent pre-Conquest monuments, which the Mexican Government is restoring. Week-end excursions are planned to those points of interest.

Opportunities are given students to speak the language with natives; to know the educational and various other institutions of the city; to meet Mexico's most distinguished educators artists and writers, many of whom are on the faculty.
