ADDRESS BY DR. RODRIGO OCTAVIO

Professor of International Law in the University of Rio de Janeiro; General Secretary of the Brazilian Academy of Letters; First Vice-President of the Institute of Lawyers

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen:

It has been for me a source for pride and satisfaction to receive the kind and honorable invitation from the president of this great university to be one of the speakers on this solemn occasion.
